What is the JCR?

The 'JCR' or 'Junior Common Room' means two things.

Firstly, the body of undergraduate members of the college, from finalists to first years. The JCR is also the committee made up of students, who are here to help you out! They will run events from Welfare Weeks to BOPs for the JCR to enjoy.

Secondly, it refers to the physical room in college reserved for use by those members - our common room is a lively and comfortable space, hosting our meetings, welfare teas and much more.

One area has a piano, foosball table, TV, nintendo switch and PS5 as well as a welfare corner, kitchen and comfy places to sit and relax.

How to get involved

CR meetings occur every two weeks during term time, typically on Sunday evenings. These meetings are the main way most students are actively involved in Univ student democracy and have a few key components. One element is the proposal and voting upon of motions. For example, a motion to fund a student project could be proposed and voted upon.

The second is elections or hustings (in cases where voting takes place later), where students can put themselves forward to become part of the committee. JCR meetings also have free pizza available! Packing List

Here are some suggestions from the JCR on what to bring with you when arriving into College. It's not an exhaustive list but should cover the essentials! For an extremely comprehensive version we recommend the list linked here. However, it is important to bear in mind that on a 'short contract' you most likely will have to move most things out of college at the end of each term.

Household Essentials:

- Bedding: duvet, duvet cover, pillow, pillow case, fitted sheet (most rooms will have single beds but college will inform you if this isn't the case)
- Toiletries: toothbrush, toothpaste, shampoo, etc.

- Towels
- Hangers for shirts/coats
- Laundry detergent

Admin:

- Bank cards (since COVID, many Oxford businesses take card only)
- Cash
- ID: pass port and/or driving license
- Medical details
- Passport style photos

Electronics:

- Laptop/computer and charger
- Phone charger
- Extension cable
- Ethernet cable (optional)

Clothes:

- Casual clothes (warmer clothes for autumn and winter)
- Fancy dress (for BOPs)
- Bring a white t-shirt you don't mind drawing on for the first BOP!
- Formal clothes (for Formal Hall and events like Balls)

Academic:

- Stationery: pens, correction fluid, etc.
- Paper/notepads
- Folders (to store work)
- Subject specific equipment: exam suitable calculator for STEM students, etc.

Food:

- Some plates and bowls
- Cutlery; fork, knife spoon, etc
- Glasses (plastic/glasses/mugs)
- Tea towels and dish clothes
- Kettle (some rooms and kitchens may already have kettles)
- Bottle opener

Washing up brush

Optional:

- Pins for your pinboard
- Posters, photos, other pinboard suitable decorations
- Cuddly toys
- Musical instruments (college can sometimes provide keyboards but music scholars get priority!)
- Bike (not a necessity in First Year, but very worthwhile from Second Year helpful this year if your department is quite far from Univ).

Please don't bring (and why)

- A car Oxford is a walking/biking/public transport city
- Pets we already have a cat and a tortoise!
- Blu-tack it messes up the walls
- Fire hazards including candles College not literally being on fire is something we all appreciate

Sub Fusc

Sub Fusc is Oxford's academic dress which is worn at Matriculation (the ceremony for formally joining the University) and for Examinations. Your gown is also worn over your clothes at formal hall at College.

Sub Fusc consists of:

- Dark suit with dark socks, OR dark skirts with black tights, Or dark trousers with dark socks
- Plain white collared shirt or white blouse with sleeves
- Black shoes
- Dark jacket, if required work underneath the gown
- *White bow tie, black bow tie, black fell-lenth tie, OR black ribbon
- *An academic gown (Freshers wear a commoners gown)
- *a mortar board

*These items can be bought from shops in Oxford (Ede & Ravenscroft, Shepherd & Woodward) so no need to worry about them until you arrive!

Social Media and Communication

WhatsApp, Instagram, Facebook, Youni

Univ has a Whatsapp community which has an announcement page, as well as your year group group chat. Make sure you scan the QR code at the end of the guide to join!

Facebook is also widely used across Oxford for communication. University societies use Facebook to share events and information so make sure you join the groups you're interested in. There also helpful groups such as 'OxTickets' where you can sell and buy tickets among other things.

The JCR will use its Instagram pages to announce events and keep you up to date with Univ life. You can also DM them with any suggestions or concerns. Many Univ and Oxford wide societies also have instagram pages. Follow @univjcr_, @univ_welfare, @univentz_, @univsport_, @univ_music_ and more!

The JCR is also trialing a new app called Youni which centralises all the events around Oxford to try and deal with the fact that so many social media platforms are used. Set up an account and follow the Univ JCR page!

Tech Support

SSO

Top Tip: Keep on top of your emails! There will be a lot of important information from College, Department, your tutors and the JCR!

Your Oxford SSO (Single Sign On) is an eight letter username (e.g univ1234) plus a password set by you. You must also have MFA (multi-factor authentication) set up which adds another level of security when you login.

Your SSO gives you access to your University Outlook (email) inbox as well as Microsoft services including Word, Teams, Excel, etc. These can be downloaded for free onto your computer.

Canvas is another service used by many departments/faculties at Oxford to upload reading lists and other resources accessible via your SSO.

You also have a 'remote access account' which is used for you to login to the University-wide WI-FI service Eduroam.

You will receive instructions for how to set up your SSO and Remote Access accounts prior to your arrival. Follow the instructions carefully and remember your passwords!

Bod Card

All students are issued a University Card when they arrive. This card, often referred to as your 'Bod Card', is really important. You use it to access buildings and libraries around the University and College as well as being used to pay for meals in the Buttery at College. Make sure you look after it!

Printing

In Univ, printing is done over the web – log in to https://webprint.univ.ox.ac.uk with your SSO, go to the WebPrint section, select your settings and upload your files. You can then scan your bod card at any printer and it will print for you. Printers are currently found in the: 10 Merton Street Basement, JCR & MCR, and 90 High Street Lecture Room Lobby.

Intranet

The Univ Intranet can be accessed by logging into https://intranet.univ.ox.ac.uk/ with your SSO. It has information on many aspects of the college including accommodation and various policies, as well as weekly hall and formal menus. It is also the place to go to top up your bod card balance to pay for meals, make bookings for formals and the squash court.

Accommodation Guide

When you arrive at Univ you'll be notified of where you are staying on site. Here is a guide to the different areas of accommodation at Univ.

90/91 High Street and the Old Bursary

Some of the rooms in 90/91 High Street are typical student rooms consisting of a bed, desk, mini-fridge, sink (not always present) and cupboard. Other rooms are slightly different because they don't have a desk or mini-fridge in. Your desk, along with a mini-fridge, will be located along the corridor in the shared study space, along with your three other roommates' desks and mini-fridges. 90/91 High Street also has a kitchen and kitchenette.

The Old Bursary is attached to 90/91 High Street but functions independently. There are three floors, with two rooms and a bathroom (including a toilet and shower) on each floor. A combination of first, second and third years may be living in this building. Each room here has a sink, mini-fridge and microwave, as the nearest kitchens are a bit far.

Main Quad

Main quad rooms are most often assigned to first years. They are the oldest accommodation in Univ. They are most often shared sets; you will have a room and a shared study with another person. The rooms will have a sink in them. A mini fridge and a desk will be in the shared study. The size of the room varies. All rooms are single beds.

Radcliffe Quad (Rad Quad)

Rad Quad lies directly adjacent to Main Quad. It was built later than Main Quad, but in the same style. You can access Rad Quad from Main Quad or Logic Lane. A combination of first-years and third- years live here. As well, all students on main site access laundry facilities at Rad Quad through staircase 11. Similar to Main Quad rooms, you can expect in Rad Quad rooms with single beds, sinks, cupboards, mini-fridges and shared sets too.

Durham Buildings (DB1 and DB2)

DB1 (Durham Building 1) and DB2 (Durham Building 2) are located on Logic Lane opposite Rad Quad. The JCR is also located in DB2. Rooms in DB1/DB2 are decently sized typical student rooms. You can expect shared bathrooms as well as sinks, mini-fridges and desks in your rooms. Showers in DB1 are next the kitchen in basement.

Residents in DB1/DB2 also have the privilege of immediate kitchen access with there being one kitchen in DB1, a kitchen on the second and third floors of DB2, and the JCR kitchen on the ground floor of DB2.

83,84,85 High Street

83/84/85 High Street can initially seem like a bit of a maze until you find your way around! Most bedrooms are standard single rooms with a sink, mini- fridge, desk and a cupboard. Like all High Street facing rooms, they have a great view!

Goodhart

Goodhart rooms are normally reserved for 3rd and 4th year students but some rooms are reserved for first year students. Students with access needs will often be allocated to rooms in the Goodhart building. All rooms in this building are equipped with an en-suite bathroom. Most rooms have a double bed, but some are single beds. All are attached to a kitchen. They are very spacious rooms and there is a lift.

Kitchens at Univ

Univ has several kitchens across main site. All students will have access to a kitchen, even if their room is not directly next to a kitchen. If you're not sure where you have kitchen access, email Shane Pledge who runs the accommodation team. There are more modern kitchens in the Goodhart building which have induction hobs so please bear this in mind when buying saucepans etc. Other kitchens are located in 90/91 high street, DB1 and DB2.

Laundry

On Main Site in College, the laundry room is located in the basement accessible from Staircase 11 in Radcliffe Quad.

The laundry room has washing machines, dryers, ironing facilities as well as some space for air-drying in the adjacent drying room.

The washing machines and dryers cost a few pounds (\mathfrak{L}^2 -3) per cycles and take contactless card payment (inc. Apple and Android pay).

Post

Every member of the JCR has their own 'pidge' (pigeonhole) where letters are delivered by the porters. Pidge are also used by friends and tutors to deliver messages or work.

As well as 'pidges', college also has a parcel locker (Packcity) located near the Goodhart building. Parcels, including Amazon packages, are delivered to the locker and you receive an email to collect

The Buttery operates on a pay-as-you-go system. In order to pay for you meals you can top up your Bod card through the Univ Intranet, where you will also pay your battels (bills)

Oxford Jargon Buster:

• **Battels**: The termly charges made to you by college. Includes accommodation, food, etc.

- **Bod**: Short for Bodleian, the main university library
- BOP: 'Big Organised Party' held in College bar usually with a theme
- Buttery: The college kitchens where meals are collected from
- Collections: Informal subject tests usually at the beginning of term
- **First Public Examination**: Either Prelims or Mods. Often abbreviated to F.P.E., the first university examinations you sit
- **Formal**: A traditional meal held in college, suit or smart dress required. Need to sign up.
- **Hilary**: Often shortened to HT, the second of the three Oxford terms, running from January to mid-March.
- Master: The head of the college (referred to as the head of house) of University College. The current master is Baroness Valerie Amos.
- Matriculation: The formal process of admitting new students to the university. Takes place on the Saturday of 1st week in Michaelmas.
- Michaelmas: The first of the Oxford terms, from early October to early December.
- **Porter**: Vital members of college staff who are a combination of receptionists and security staff. They also know everything that goes on in college. Can be found in the Porters' Lodge, often shortened to the Plodge.
- **Trinity**: The third Oxford term, in summer. From late April to mid-June.
- **Tutor**: Someone who teaches a student on an individual basis or in a small group. Gives tutorials.
- **Tutorial**: Class either on a one-to-one basis or with one or two other students. Students must undertake prepatory work for each tutorial, including background reading, essay-writing and problem solving. What makes Oxford Oxford! Often shortened to 'tute.'
- **Scout**: a cleaner who manages your accommodation area (e.g DB1).
- Vac: A nickname for the 'vacation' or holidays.
- **Univ:** University College (also known as the best college in Oxford)
